4-MAIN PROBLEMS

TECHNICAL ASPECTS:

- Low farmer capability to use and manage farm machinery
- Limited choice of suitable machinery (task specific)
- Lack of qualified personnel or a mechanization training institute
- Lack of maintenance and servicing provision

MAIN PROBLEMS (cont.)

POLICY ASPECTS:

- Weak producer financial strength
- Lack of extension services
- Poor geographic coverage by financial institutions, cumbersome procedures
- Absence of any policy or coordination for parties with an interest in the mechanization sector
- Few farm machinery suppliers
- Existing constraints (small size of plots and farms, topography) to a land use policy.

MAIN PROBLEMS

- Non-existence of testing and certification, non-application of standards
- Difficult access to credit and finance
- Investment Code out of date

5-RESULTS

- **VALIDATION WORKSHOP FOR THE "STRATEGY DOCUMENT AND OPERATING PLAN" 29 JANUARY 2013**
comprising three strategic axes:
 - ***AXIS 1 : IMPROVEMENT OF USER ACCESS TO FARM IMPLEMENTS***
 - Identification of machinery that can be built within 3 years, 10 years and in more than 10 years
 - ***AXIS 2 : STRENGTHENING PRIVATE SECTOR INVOLVEMENT IN THE RICE MECHANIZATION SECTOR***
 - ***AXIS 3 : STATE INSTITUTIONAL AND SOCIO-ECONOMIC SUPPORT***
 - Testing and certification body: strengthening the National Center for Training and Farm Machinery.
 - Ensure availability of suitable equipment

5.1-CHANGE-RELATED POLICY TOOLS

- Proposed policy step: strengthen the CFAMA as a testing and certification body
- Changes:
 - Assure the conformity and quality of equipment reaching producers.
 - Adapt to local requirements and standardize imported machines and locally made machinery.
- Target:
 - Importing agents (machines and spare parts)
 - Local artisans (raw materials)
 - Service providers and producers

5.1-CHANGE-RELATED POLICY TOOLS

Tools

- Circularize the steps involved in testing, evaluation, certification and meeting standards
- Strengthen CFAMA in testing, evaluation homologation of equipment

Steps:

- Equipment provision
- Capacity building and recruitment
- A study of standards to be applied

5.2-CHANGE-RELATED POLICY TOOLS

- Suggested policy step: enable sufficient suitable equipment
- Change: Ensure availability of region-specific equipment on the basis of soil type, holding size and the socio-economic conditions of the users, importers and retailers.
- Steps: carry out a more accurate study in addition to pre-sizing machinery requirements

5.3-CHANGE-RELATED POLICY TOOLS

- Suggested policy step: identification of equipment for local manufacture within 3 years, 10 years, more than 10 years
- Change: ensure availability and quality improvement, better trained local artisans.
- Steps: fine-tune identified equipment through on-site trialing.

5.3-CHANGE-RELATED POLICY TOOLS

- Suggested policy step: recruit the necessary qualified staff and train stakeholders on the rice value chain
- Change: assure the quality of machinery produced, producers trained to use and manage modern machinery
- Steps: carry out training for all stakeholders

6-TRAINING FOR EACH STAKEHOLDER GROUP

- **LOCAL MANUFACTURERS**
 - TECHNICAL AND FINANCIAL CAPACITY BUILDING: STANDARDS AND QUALITY, FORGING AND METAL WORK, BUSINESS MANAGEMENT.
 - STRENGTHEN MARKETING AND ADMINISTRATIVE MANAGEMENT
 - LITERACY
- **IMPORTERS**
 - CAPACITY BUILD ON AFTER-SALES SERVICE AND GOVERNMENT CONTRACT PROCEDURES (MEETING SPECIFICATIONS)

6-TRAINING FOR EACH STAKEHOLDER GROUP

- **Service providers and operators**

Machinery management and maintenance, after-sales service

- **Producers**

Training on maintenance, machinery handling and safe working rules

- **Technicians**

- Staff from the testing and certification body: training drivers and certified mechanics
- Training engineers in design and as farm machinery instructors.

7. OUTLOOK: TECHNICAL PLAN

Identification of suitable machinery (equipment)

- CFAMA accreditation, set up the infrastructure and recruit staff
- Capacity build for testing and certification (both institutionally and in human resources)
- Improvement/acceleration of the plan to promote local production of farm equipment and machinery
- Capacity build maintenance and repair services in rural areas

Guidance:

7.OUTLOOK: POLICY PLAN

- Policy advocacy: at Ministerial level for Agriculture, Trade, Finance and Budget, and Industry because the strategy will be regulated by a Government order in council
- Implementation of Change policies to improve the rice sector mechanization environment
- Private sector requirement (voice): establish a platform for private sector involvement in mechanization
- Look for funding
- Monitoring & Evaluation
